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As leaders in prevention, we at CHC approach our work comprehensively for maximum impact. We are more than service providers – we are storytellers, changemakers, and spark lighters. We transform the narrative for those we work with and in doing so, we change lives.

It's been a stimulating year, where we successfully piloted a new mentoring curriculum, Speaking to the Potential and Resilience of every Kid (SPARK). This fresh program more fully addresses the needs of children and develops their SPARK so they can become the leaders of tomorrow.

Suicide prevention training was targeted to youth and educators to help prepare them to support individuals who may be experiencing thoughts of suicide. In addition, we continue our work at the Lehigh County jail to support incarcerated individuals in building beneficial life skills. These are some of our ongoing efforts and at the core of our services.

We also focused delivery of our evidence-based programs to entire school grade levels to make a deeper impact, including Vaping Education for young children to avert the start of unhealthy habits.

In 2022-2023 we entered into an exciting partnership with Lehigh County Children and Youth, the Salvation Army and Office of Juvenile Justice to launch a collaborative and supportive program to strengthen families and prevent community violence.

Our experienced staff are unsung heroes in this work and we cannot overstate their importance to the effect we make as an organization. They dedicate their hearts and souls to making our communities healthy and strong, and they bring light to the uncomfortable so that it can be confronted, challenged and changed.

We greatly value the community's ongoing support, and thank you for being part of the spark lighters that are the Center for Humanistic Change.

The Center for Humanistic Change conducts pre- and post-surveys to establish the impact of prevention education. Program results are analyzed to determine if there is a significant difference in knowledge score and attitude shifts between the pre- and post-surveys; meaning their attitudes improved and knowledge increased. These results are part of a fuller evaluation that considers factors such as the level of pre-survey knowledge and attitudes, and the regularity and consistency of prevention education among the population.

Mission and Outreach



At CHC, we give people, especially youth, the knowledge and tools they need to make better-informed and more positive life choices.

The Center for Humanistic Change prepares people to meet life's challenges.

We believe that individuals equipped with knowledge and life skills are more likely to make positive, healthy choices in their lives.

CHC offers evidence-based and custom-designed education focused primarily on building resiliency and preventing substance abuse, that gives people the knowledge and skills they need to make better choices.

We serve elementary, middle, and high school-aged youth, as well as parents and educators, and employees at workplaces throughout Lehigh Valley, Pennsylvania.

Although primarily school-focused, we serve people wherever they are – in schools, neighborhoods, community-based organizations, communities of faith, and worksites.

We Educate

We "train the trainers" and offer programs especially designed for parents and educators. We teach parents how to communicate more effectively with their children and to recognize the signs of alcohol and substance abuse, dating violence, and cyberbullying. We offer custom-designed training for schools, businesses, and community organizations on topics ranging from alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use prevention, relationship and family skills, personal life skills, and violence and bullying prevention.



We Support

We support at-risk students by teaching them the necessary skills to cope with challenges they face. We work with schools to identify students whose alcohol, substance abuse, or mental health issues are becoming barriers to their success — and then help these students get back on track.

We Lead

We track local and national trends to ensure our programs are relevant and reflect evidence -based best practices. We also take a leadership role in bringing together people from all sectors of the Lehigh Valley to collectively address the issues of alcohol and substance abuse.

CHC facilitates interactive experience-based trainings and small groups that engage participants in meaningful learning. Custom programs have been designed in response to the specific needs of schools, community organizations and businesses in the Lehigh Valley.

Many of our evidence-based programs have been approved by the National Registry of Evidence-Based Programs and Practices (NREPP), which is hosted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

Making a Difference, One Student at a Time

CHC Mentoring Program: School Mentors meet with students individually or in groups, and discuss a broad array of social-emotional and learning concerns. In 2022-2023, **staff mentored 1,006 students from 32 schools** throughout the Lehigh Valley. Improved and maintained program outcomes included: 43% of students reported they better understood another's point of view; 51% stated that they were able to communicate better with peers; 52% sought help from adults; and 53% of students reported they could better handle stress at home and at school.



CHC will launch a new evidence-based mentoring curriculum for the 2023-2024 school year, entitled **SPARK** (Speaking to the Potential, Ability and Resilience inside every Kid) to assist students with communication, problem-solving and conflict resolution skills. The program aims to increase student connectedness, reduce risk factors, and uncover resiliency to promote emotional well-being and school success.



Student Assistance Program (SAP): CHC's SAP team served all 93 schools in Lehigh County and 55 schools in Northampton County with Liaison services including technical assistance, material dissemination, newsletters and other communications, team maintenance, evaluation services, professional development for teachers and administrators, and BH Works – a behavioral health screener provided to elementary, middle and high schools. Small groups were available to elementary, middle and high school students who needed support on various topics such as social skills, anger management, anxiety, self-esteem, friendship, conflict resolution, grief, changing families, coping skills, diversity and more. CHC's SAP Liaisons directly worked with 67 of the 93 schools in Lehigh County and 44 of the 55 schools in Northampton County for SAP core team meetings, SAP consultations, parent/teacher meetings, SAP screenings, and SAP groups.

CHC hosted two educational SAP Consortiums and welcomed a combined 149 virtual attendees. The first in November 2022 featured licensed psychologist Georgia Bomgardner, PhD on Post Pandemic Resilience-Restoring ourselves and our students, Post-Traumatic stress and growth, and The Shanthi Project where she is Director of Community Education and Engagement. The second in March 2023 featured Perry Rosen, PhD presenting on Comprehensive School-Based Suicide Prevention. She is a consulting psychologist at the Pennsylvania Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) at the Department of Human Services (DHS) in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. She is also a Pennsylvania licensed psychologist, Nationally Certified School Psychologist (NCSP), and a Pennsylvania certified special educator.

A **Northampton County Network meeting** was held by CHC in the spring of 2023 for all Northampton County school SAP teams, with guest presenters addressing SAP concerns.

CHC continues as a provider of the **Commonwealth Approved Training Program**, and in 2022-2023 **trained and certified 114 new SAP professionals** from the region.

Program Impact

We know prevention education works,

because we measure changes in knowledge and attitude through pre- and post-surveys. Our evidence-based programming has been tested and proven to make a difference in the lives of those served. However, it is more often through our focused time and face-to-face interaction with students and adults that we learn about the power of our work and the fuller impact we make in their lives.

The attentive and caring staff at the Center for Humanistic Change responded to the additional prevention programming requests of the **Allentown School District** following the loss of a

student to Fentanyl poisoning. **CHC served 7,368 students and educators with sessions** in Current Drug Trends (reaching 1,143 students); Vaping Education (reaching 2,433 students); HOPE - Heroin Opioid Prevention Education (reaching 1,808 students); and Choices, Chances, Changes (reaching 1,984 students.) The need for prevention education for students as young as 3rd grade was a response to the growing number of younger children experimenting with vaping devices.

CHC's signature program, the **Mock Teen Bedroom**, was held at back-to-school nights, community events and health fairs throughout the Lehigh Valley, including Emmaus, Parkland, Northampton, Bangor, and Wilson High Schools, Cetronia Ambulance Corps' Health and Wellness Expo, Oasis Community Center, and the Carbon Lehigh Counselors Association Conference. The Mock Teen Bedroom is a highly requested educational program for adults only, where participants learn how to identify drug paraphernalia, how substances and substance use can be disguised, up-to-date information about drug trends, and what resources are available in the Lehigh Valley.

The **2022 Opioid Education Forum** presented by CHC and the Lehigh and Northampton Counties Drug and Alcohol Divisions was held live on October 6, 2022 at the Hotel Bethlehem, and live-streamed across the Lehigh Valley. The dynamic keynote speakers were renowned **Tony Hoffman**, former BMX bike champion and Olympic coach; and **Joseph Green**, story teller and award winning spoken word poet. Both featured speakers talked about their history of substance use disorder and life in recovery. Local community speakers included **Amie Allanson-Dundon**, Network Director of Clinical Therapy Services at St. Luke's Health Network; **Heather Barna-Dowling**, Director of River Lotus Healing; **Angela Stevens-Carr**, Director of FORT Program at MARS; and **Rhonda Miller**, Executive Director of the Oasis Community Recovery Center. These local speakers addressed the link between substance use and mental health, the myriad of therapeutic approaches that are available, and what local resources are available to people with substance use disorders and their families.

In total **388 people participated in the 2022 forum**, including 115 attending the live event where they enjoyed a buffet breakfast, Q&A sessions with the speakers, and the opportunity to have their copy of Joseph's Green's book, *Talk Ugly and Other Poems*, signed in person by the author. One hundred people individually joined online, and

another 173 participated in the live stream at meeting "hubs" or gatherings of students who viewed the forum together in classrooms at DeSales University, Moravian University, Carbon Institute of Technology, and Bethlehem Area Vo-Tech School, to name a few.

Program Highlights

As a state resource for **Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorder**, CHC held a virtual **FASD Forum** on September 9, 2022 which welcomed 78 diverse participants from Lehigh and Northampton Counties. With a focus on local support, the speakers presented on how to manage an FASD diagnosis and how women who find themselves struggling with an alcohol addiction can get the help they need to ensure a healthy labor and baby.



Speaker **Kathy Mitchell**, who has a daughter with an **FASD**, spoke about her personal experience and the steps she's had to take to not only advocate for her daughter but to change the system to help other families. CHC received a lot of great feedback and attendees felt they could continue their education through the valuable CHC resource guide.



The Center for Humanistic Change provides evidence-based and custom-designed program for all ages - even the mature population. A new **gambling awareness** program, **Not a Chance**, was delivered to seven Northampton County Senior Centers, **reaching 117 senior participants**.

Several CHC initiatives continued to focus on the opioid epidemic and harm reduction by providing our HOPE presentations and Narcan® training and distribution at various sites throughout the Lehigh Valley. Trainings were provided to school staff in the Allentown School District, Northern Lehigh High School, Wind Gap Middle School, Plainfield Elementary School, and members of the Lehigh Carbon School Counselors Association. We delivered presentations and Narcan® kits to college students at Moravian University and Cedar Crest College. We also trained and provided kits for community members at LVHN Homecare Division, East Hills Moravian Church, Oasis Community Center, Promise Neighborhoods, and Easton Community Center. Additionally, many county employees received training and Narcan® kits at the Lehigh County Government Center, Northampton County Health and Human Services, and Northampton County Courthouse. In total, CHC distributed nearly 800 Narcan® kits, provided by the City of Bethlehem Health Bureau, and more than 400 medication lockboxes throughout both counties.

The Center for Humanistic Change received an important grant from the PA Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) for Substance Abuse Education and Demand Reduction. The grant was specifically awarded to **educate community transporters**, including Lyft, Uber, public transportation and school bus drivers, about the opioid epidemic and how to respond to an overdose. After completing the one-hour online training, participants receive a certificate from the training website *Get Naloxone Now* and a medication lockbox that includes a two-dose Narcan® kit, gloves, mouth protector, information about opioids and overdose, and an *I Carry Narcan*® sticker for their cars.



A second part of the grant will include **educating prescribers about safe guidelines and recommendations** on how they can encourage safe opioid use among their patients and clients. We will focus outreach to veterinarians because they prescribe opioids for their animal clients and there is the potential for medication misuse by pet owners. Education will include the safe storage and increasing presence of Xylazine, an animal sedative used in veterinary offices being found in the Fentanyl supply.

We are also reaching out to Emergency Department prescribers to provide opioid prescribing guidelines and tips on how to talk to patients about potential narcotic misuse.

Through this project, CHC will aim to educate and supply Narcan® to at least 225 community transporters statewide and provide awareness guidelines to 60 prescribers in the Lehigh Valley by the end of June 2024.
